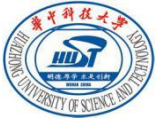
Course Description:

This course is designed to be a broad introduction to the field of sociology. Students will engage in critical thinking about social and culture issues and gain exposure to different types of sociological research. Topics include methods of social research and investigation; the role of individuals in groups, organizations, and society; socialization and education; stratification; race and ethnicity; science, culture, and religion; formal and informal organization; and economic and political systems.

Course Format and Requirements:

Attendance

Students are expected to attend class on a regular basis. Attendance will be taken throughout the semester. While attendance is not directly calculated into the student's course grade, it will be a factor in determining participation grades. After a student's 4th absence, each unexcused absence will result in an automatic drop in grade. With each unexcused absence your final letter grade will be dropped $\frac{1}{2}$ a grade – NO EXCEPTIONS (e.g.: A to A-).

Paper Assignments:

You will complete **two** (2-3 pages each) paper assignments. These papers will test your comprehension of course readings as well as your ability to explain, synthesize, and make connections between the readings in your own words. All papers must be double spaced, in 12-point Times New Roman font, with 1" margins all around. You will submit papers electronically. **No late** paper assignment

Examination:

Midterm Exam: The midterm exam will be worth 20% of your grade. No make-up Midterm exam, unless you have valid document from a doctor for emergency or illness.

Final Exam: The final will be cumulative to allow you to demonstrate the breadth of knowledge you've acquired throughout the semester. In addition to the variety of questions listed as possible for the midterm, the final will likely include a larger analysis component. We will review for the final on the last day of class. **No make-up final exam for any reasons.**

NOTE: All exams will cover material from lecture, videos, class discussion, and readings. All exams are not open-book and you are not allowed to bring notes. All exams will be multiple choice and true-false questions and one short-answer question. Turn off all electronic devices during an exam, including cell phones and get to the exam by the start time.
